

It was honored to receive its second fiveyear Drug Free Communities Support Grant (DFC) by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) in 2013. Its goals are to reduce substance use among youth and to establish and strengthen collaboration among communities, private nonprofit agencies and federal, state and local governments to support the efforts of its community coalition to prevent and reduce substance use among youth. Working to reach Manhasset youth before they are in trouble, CASA connects parents, school, youth and the community as partners in this common goal. CASA engages its members to view substance use as a public health problem and distributes its efforts utilizing specific strategies that address why and where substance use is prevalent in the Manhasset community and how to change the environment whereby it exists.
