Munsey Park SCA Red Ribbon Week Committee Chairs, Peggy Gajdjis and Rosa Stein and Shelter Rock School SCA Red Ribbon Week Committee Chairs, Leslie Fleck, Erica Kinloch and Tara LaSalle, worked diligently to ensure successful student programming and parent education outreach. In celebration, ribbons are being distributed to Manhasset Elementary School parents as well as Manhasset businesses and clergy to encourage the communitywide celebration. Coordinated by the committee, students will express the importance of making responsible decisions and healthy choices through a schoolwide art project and wear red during the week.

Under the direction of Ms. Caitlin Finley, the Manhasset Middle School SADD Club members are working to promote the theme "Above the Influence" with fellow students. Kaiman Meets With Students to Sign Environmental Pledge

Supervisor Jon Kaiman recently met with environmentally conscious students from Manhasset High School who have been on a campaign to spread awareness among elected officials and a variety of power authorities on the importance and dire need for reflective roofs. According to energy experts, altering the way a building generates its power supply and conserves energy can have a profound impact on the amount it saves, both environmentally and economically.

"It's great to see motivated young adults spread awareness on factors contributing to climate change," said Supervisor Kaiman. "There are indeed steps that local municipalities, businesses and residents can all take to fight global warming and we ought to explore all responsible options to do so."

The United States Environmental Pro-

tection Agency states that Americans spend about \$40 billion annually to air condition buildings. Reflective roof products can lower roof surface temperature by up to 100 degrees, decreasing the amount of heat transferred into buildings and thereby saving residents and businesses hundreds of dollars on their heating bills

Supervisor Kaiman also signed a petition presented by students Christina Colletti, Jennifer Juliano and Sloane Middleton which states that signatory believes that "Reflective Roofs can help save Planet Earth."
