being victims of sexual assault. And, if recidivism, lack of rehabilitation, and sexual victimization are not enough, further research reveals that youth under 18 incarcerated in adult facilities are 36 times more likely to commit suicide.

I urge our newly elected senator, Senator Elaine Phillips to support the Raise The Age legislation that has been before the NYS Senate for several years. Several legislators have spoken in support of this legislation, including Senate Majority Leader John Flanagan, Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie and Senate IDC Leader Jeffrey Klein. Gov. Cuomo has also voiced support for laws that would keep children under the age of 18 out of adult prisons. The bill, furthermore, would ensure that a parent or guardian be present during questioning and sentencing and that a juvenile would not be

imprisoned for breaking parole—as long as he or she is not a danger to others. And finally, and most important, the bill would require family support centers and special care for children with significant behavioral health issues.

Funding was already earmarked by the governor to move youth offenders out of adult state prisons, and provide them with rehabilitative services. The bill has the support of over 200 organizations and hundreds of clergy and community groups, who have been working across the state for 10 years to raise awareness of this issue. Raising the age and providing real rehabilitative services would serve the greater good of New York communities by reducing crime, reducing recidivism, and most importantly, by giving these extraordinarily vulnerable children the potential to escape a future defined only by their worst mistakes.
